Building a future thanks to microcredit

In 2020, 35% more women were able to start their own small businesses and improve their families> livelihoods thanks to our microfinance program. Our microfinance program is managed by women and primarily helps women. It is an education, credit and savings program

through which microloans are distributed to groups of women and men and a savings culture is promoted. The program acquires the financial means for economic independence and an official state certification to operate as a village bank. Small loans are primarily needed for farm work and small businesses to successfully increase household income. With the microfinance program, women gain a strong voice in the community. The core elements of the microfinance program are trainings, income-generating workshops, loans and savings.





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This is how Guiré was able to run a successful restaurant in Burkina Faso and provide for her five children. Before Guiré began participating in Hunger Project Burkina Faso>s microfinance program at the Boulkon Epicenter, her business was just a small shop serving rice, soup and beans in the village market. Since obtaining a loan of 50,000 CFA franc loan (about 80 Swiss francs) and attending workshops, she has been able to grow her business and become a restaurant owner.

Guiré lives in Koussago village, in the Kirsi commune in central Burkina Faso. Her husband works as a farmer while two of



her children attend secondary school and three are in primary school.

With the microfinance loan, Guiré was able to purchase and cook more food to sell every day, increasing her client base and her profits. She was also able to purchase a bicycle to save time on her commute, pay for school fees, purchase school supplies and clothing for her children, and purchase medicine, condiments and cereal to improve the health and nutrition of her family. After just one year, Guiré grew her business enough to pay back her original loan and accrued interest.


